Canada Has 'Arrived'

Dartmouth Salutes Centennial

Three major conferences and other activities with a strong representation of well known Canadian participants are scheduled for the next two months at Dartmouth College in Hanover, N.H. They are part of Dartmouth's "Canadian Year," a salute to this country's Centennial, which began at the college last fall.

The program also includes a number of Canadian artists and professors in residence, concerts, art exhibits, film festivals, theatrical presentations in French and English and commercial exhibits.

The college said recently: "In total effort Dartmouth's Canadian Year surpasses many a native Centennial project in its scope and enthusiasm."

On April 21 Premier Louis Robichaud of New Brunswick and Governor John W. King of New Hampshire will lead a group of 24 government officials, economists, geographers and engineers in a two-day regional study of industrial developments of Southeast Canada and Northern New England.

The following week, a two-day conference on land usage in Canada and the U.S. will feature a number of provincial and federal officials.

And on May 19 and 20, the college's annual Dryfoos Conference on Public Affairs will

examine "Canadian-U.S. Relations: the Politics and Economics of Interdependence." Principal speaker at the conference will be Arnold Heeney, former Canadian ambassador to the U.S. and currently chairman of the International Joint Commission.

Among guest lecturers at Dartmouth during the next few weeks are Michael Langham, artistic director of the Stratford (Ont.) Festival Theatre; David P. Silcox, arts officer of the Canada Council; Guy Glover, executive producer of the National Film Board and Dr. Ray Prince of McGill University.

Canadian professors in residence this term are Keith Spicer and S. D. Clark of the University of Toronto, and P. B. Waite of Dalhousie University.

During the winter term, Montrealer Jack Cunningham, now studying in New York, was playwright in residence. Artists

in residence this year are Walter Murch, Jacques Hurtubise and Sorel Etrog.

Mr. Cunningham's award-winning drama "Marise" had a five-day run at Dartmouth's Studio Theatre last month. On April 18 there will be a performance by Les Jeunes Comediens du Theatre du Nouveau Monde. And on May 19 and 20, the English-speaking troupe of the National Theatre School of Canada will perform.

A number of Canadian musicians and choirs have also given performances at the college this year. And a five-day Canadian film festival begins April 16.

Chartered in 1769, Dartmouth College is noted for its undergraduate program in liberal arts and its graduate programs in medicine, business administration and engineering. It has an enrolment of 3,000 undergraduates and 400 to 500 graduates.

Campus Computers

COMPUTERS ARE the new baby in higher education—growing bigger and more expensive every day, while their place in the family increases in importance. Administrators, faculty, and students alike use them for data processing, information retrieval, research projects, and course work.

But the cost can run to several millions of dollars to install and many hundreds of thousands to operate annually. A huge university might be able to afford one of its own, but smaller institutions have had to seek another solution—cooperation.

Recently, for example, Franklin and Marshall College announced plans for a multimillion-dollar computer center—EPIC (Eastern Pennsylvania Information Center)—to link fifty or more Middle Atlantic area colleges and research institutions.

Dartmouth College has linked its computer with secondary schools as well as with institutions of higher education. The new machine, installed about the first of the year, but not yet in full operation, is expected to take on ten times the work the old one could handle. It is used primarily for teaching and research purposes, rather than administrative, and any Dartmouth student has free access to it. A nearby high school has begun a Computer Club and bought a teletype to allow direct access. The idea is to make the computer as natural a part of the classroom as the blackboard.

At Dartmouth College, mathematics professor John G. Kemeny and his seventh-grade daughter check out her homework on a home teletype console connected to the college's central computer.

Harvard Tops Endowment Funds; Has \$974.8M; Yale, MIT Next

Harvard, Yale and Massachusetts Institute of Technology top the list of 67 colleges in the nation in endowment funds, a survey by the Boston Fund showed today.

Harvard is first with endowment funds totaling \$974,881,695; Yale second with \$469,500,000, and MIT third with \$174,302,480, according to figures compiled by the mutual fund.

Close behind the top three are Princeton with \$311,446,581, University of Chicago (\$275,764,705), University of California (\$237,705,377), and Northwestern (\$204,874,374).

Others with more than \$100 million are Cornell, \$194,463,730, Stanford, \$167,161,380; Pennsylvania, \$166,190,000; John Hopkins University, \$150,762,894; Washington University (St. Louis), \$121,565,602; Rice University, \$120,760,253; California Institute of Technology, \$117,352,799; and Dartmouth, \$111,236,356.

The Boston Fund survey gave the endowment fund totals based on market values of investments. No appraisal was made of current worth of real estate in compiling the totals.

Among other schools included in the survey are: Amherst, \$99,-

253,167; McGill University (Canada), \$96,733,196; Wellesley, \$95,710,464; Vanderbilt, \$92,256,200; Duke, \$87,561,066; Emory University, \$85,684,004; Pittsburgh, \$72,810,817; Oberlin College, \$72,714,111; Carnegie Institute, \$70,724,880; Brown, \$66,499,151; Vassar, \$61,775,623; Williams, \$57,414,075.

Coeds, Dartmouth To Discuss Books

HANOVER, N. H., March 4 (AP).—All-male Dartmouth College, which recently held its annual fun-type winter carnival, held an intellectual winter carnival Saturday—with coeds.

Some 378 girls from Wellesley, Smith, Mount Holyoke and Colby Junior College are participating in book discussions with 422 Dartmouth boys. The discussions, organized by the Dartmouth College Committee on Freshman Reading, are open to all classes.
