THE CHAIRMAN'S COLUMN:

(Ed. Note: the following is a special section of comment and information to be contributed from time to time by Class Chairman ROG KLINE. Any comments, etc., you might have on the opinions expressed herein may be directed to me or to Rog at the addresses listed below the masthead).

Steve Sloca has allowed me to interrupt the marriage announcements, graduate school successes, foreign policy debates, and other matters that usually flow through these pages. From time to time I'll exercise my limited prerogatives as class Chairman in order to report items of extraordinary importance.

Today's item of extraordinary importance concerns our flagrant irresponsibility towards the Alumni Fund. So far, we have contributed less money in our first two years than any other class since at least 1950, and probably a lot farther back than that. In last spring's Fund drive, we were second to last out of fifty-nine classes in per cent of dollar objective achieved, and were absolutely dead last out of seventy-two classes tabulated for percentage of class members contributing.

A number of rationales have been offered to explain this performance: we're all alienated; we're all in grad school and have no money; the fund drive hasn't been run well; many of us are still re-paying student loans. No doubt all of these play some part, but all of them have also been factors for other alumni classes who have managed to do their share.

Perhaps a major problem is that we don't believe it's necessary to "do our share." As one of our Classmates said to me recently, "Everybody knows that private colleges aren't going to be able to exist on contributions. The government and foundations are going to have to support them."

That may be true in the future, although McGeorge Bundy at the Ford Foundation and others who should know are not so convinced. But in the very long "meantime" it remains essential that we stop passing the buck... or, start passing it, to the College.
