### Planning Completed for 65th Birthday Party


The Planning Committee with Mini-Reunion Chair **Jim Lustenader** at the helm has finalized the schedule and costs for the Class 65th Birthday Party, May 22-25 in Santa Fe. A sign-up sheet follows on page 12 and will also be posted on the Class of 1966 website.



### **Activities and Events**

Activities will start on Friday night, May 22, with a reception in La Terraza Room at the La Fonda Hotel. Dinner that evening will be on an individual basis: "block" reservations will be made at a number of nearby restaurants. Saturday will include an "a la carte" selection of events, including visits to the Georgia O'Keefe Museum, the Folk Art Museum, the State Capitol, and a botanical tour, led by Eric Treisman, Rebecca and Mike Bromley, and Margie Carpenter. Golf tee-times and tennis courts will also be available at the Black Mesa Golf Club and Bishop's Resort respectively. Saturday evening we will convene at the Rio

Chama Restaurant for reception, dinner, and talk by Anne Hillerman, daughter of the world-renown, and recently deceased, author Tony Hillerman. Sunday we will tour some of the beautiful environs, including a visit to Bandelier National Monument, an optional hike to Anasazi ruins, a visit to the Los Alamos Science Museum, and a picnic lunch. Sunday evening will be free for individual or group dinners. The 65th Birthday Party will conclude with a Monday brunch in La Fonda's La Terraza Room overlooking Santa Fe's Plaza.



### Accommodations

The La Fonda Hotel on the Plaza will serve as the “head-quarters” hotel; a block of 30 rooms is available at \$189 per night regardless of length of stay. To make reservations, call 800-523-5002 and mention “Dartmouth Class of 1966 Birthday Party”.

The Committee has also reserved a block of 20 rooms at Garrett’s Desert Inn, pictured at right, approximately two blocks from La Fonda, for \$89 (queen bed) and \$99 (2 queen beds or 1 king). Be sure to mention “Dartmouth Class of 1966 Birthday Party” to obtain the group rates at 800-888-2145. As with La Fonda, reservations for rooms before and after the reunion are available at the same rate on a “space available” basis.



### Transportation to Santa Fe

The suggested transportation mode is to fly to Albuquerque and rent a car for the hour’s drive to Santa Fe. Airlines that fly into Albuquerque include Southwest, Northwest/Delta, United, Continental, American, USAir, ExpressJet, and Frontier. Because of Southwest, fares are fairly reasonable, if you’re close to a Southwest departure airport.

An alternative method is to take advantage of **Bill Ramos’** offer: “I will fly in my Cessna 414 any & all ‘66ers & family from Albuquerque to Santa Fe and back. The 43 nautical mile flight should take about 16 minutes (add in taxi and climb out time it will be closer to 25 min). I can take up to 6 people per trip (NOT counting myself) in twin-engine, pressurized, air conditioned comfort.” Anyone interested can contact Bill, who has been flying since 1968, at wramos66@aol.com. You’ll also recall that **John Pearson** has an associate who has a self contained vintage railroad car (see [www.nyc-3.com](http://www.nyc-3.com)). The car is available in New York and could take four couples from NYC to Santa Fe via Chicago. It could return via the same route or possibly go on to the west coast, up the coast and back via the Sierra Nevadas and the Colorado Rockies. One way, part way and day trip options would be available to classmates from both coasts and to classmates living anywhere along the route the train will follow. 
### Fall Mini-Reunion

I had a great experience over Homecoming Weekend this year that I want to share with all classmates. All aspects of Homecoming were great (except the outcome of the football game, although it was great just to be there in the stadium again), but a real highlight was visiting our new Class gift to the College and the DOC, the Class of 1966 Lodge. It is a beautiful structure, a short drive from the Campus, a short hike off the road in Etna, and near the Appalachian Trail. It is wonderful to think that this large, 4000 sq. ft., finely crafted log-cabin style structure was designed and built by students. It is available for students, faculty, and alumni functions and will be heavily used by our Class for future get-togethers. Our inaugural use at Homecoming was a dinner for 45 of our Classmates, spouses, and guests. They all shared my very positive feelings about the new Lodge.



One of the most amazing aspects of the Lodge is what a deal we got for this major Class gift. 


Kernochan said he was asked by the Fulbright Program to select three countries he would like to visit, and Vietnam was at the top of his list. He said he has always had a fascination with Southeast Asian country. “Vietnam is an ancient country, and I look forward to learning more about it,” said Kernochan, who will make his first visit to the country next year.

He is preparing for his trip by taking a tutorial to learn Vietnamese. “This will be as much of a learning experience for me as for the students I will be teaching,” added Denny, who is scheduled to return to CSUN in fall 2009. His duties in Vietnam will include teaching several courses, mentoring research efforts, and lecturing at other universities.

Kernochan started as a lecturer at CSUN in 1999. He teaches international business, a business honors seminar and supervises management internships. He is also adviser to the Business Honors Association. He has a bachelor’s degree from Dartmouth College, a master’s from UCLA and an MBA from the Iran Center for Management Studies in Tehran, Iran. He spent 12 years living and working overseas in the Middle East and Europe. “I’ve always been interested in overseas business,” Kernochan said. “I’m always looking for new challenges.” Congratulations, Denny, on this great honor!

Shima Dowla ‘11 (pictured at right with Gene) is looking at breathing and heart-rate responses to reflex breathing inhibition in rats as part of a study of sudden infant death syndrome. ‘Dartmouth students are very bright and dedicated’, states Nattie. ‘They work hard and reliably. They ask great questions, often ones that I have not thought of. I did sociology research with Dartmouth Professor Derek Phillips. I correlated the geographical distribution of mental illness with so-called psychosomatic diseases. This gave me my first inkling that I could be an academician and scientist.’”



**Ed Jereb** reports after a trip to visit his daughter Justine ‘94, “I looked up **John Pappenheimer** in Seattle. After leaving Dartmouth he worked as a reporter, fishing boat captain and magazine publisher before retiring to write young adult books at his waterfront home that he shares with his artist wife. His daughter Zoe works in NYC as a graphic artist while getting a masters at Pratt. A son Cy died from a brain tumor in 1990. These days he stays mentally and physically fit by working out unique theories of ‘papenomics’ and sculling out of the Lake Washington Rowing Club.”

## In Memorium



It is with a great deal of sadness that we report the death of **Richard A. Kaiser** on November 17. A native of Newburgh, NY, Rich graduated from the Newburgh Free Academy, where he was "leader" of the band, a National Merit Scholar, a debater, and member of the golf team. At Dartmouth Rich continued his involvement in the Band and joined Zeta Psi Fraternity and the JLC. Rich entered the Dartmouth Medical School our senior year, graduating in 1967, and completing his medical degree at the Harvard Medical School in 1969. Beginning in 1971, he served for two and a half years in the United States Navy, in which he rose to the rank of Lieutenant Commander aboard the nuclear submarine USS Will Rogers. Following residency at the Beth Israel Hospital in Boston, Rich established a practice in general and pediatric surgery based in Montclair, NJ, from which he retired in 2004.

An avid golfer, Rich was also an active alumnus, serving as a Class Officer, a District Enrollment Director, and the perpetual organizer of our '66 reunion golf tournaments, which he had a habit of winning by concocting incredibly complicated scoring systems! His hobbies included German literature and contract bridge. Many of us will remember his sense of humor, his hearty laugh, and great stories, particularly the difficulty of raising money from other doctors. His conversational English had clearly been affected by his time in the Navy!

He is survived by his wife of forty years, Debbie, a daughter Hilary K. Grove '97 and her husband Geoffrey Grove, son David Kaiser '93 and his wife Tracy Gleason, brother Samuel, and grandchildren, Ellery and Toby Gleason-Kaiser. ## Other Dartmouth News

According to a recent issue of Forbes, “Big Green grads are in the money. So says a recent study compiled by PayScale.com that looks at earnings of alumni at colleges around the country. Graduates of Dartmouth College, ten and twenty years into their careers, finished on top of the list with a median compensation of \$134,000, edging out alumni of Princeton University who finished second with a median comp of \$131,000.”

The Big Green Bus—12 Dartmouth students traveling around the United States in a veggie-oil-powered school bus to spark dialogue about sustainable living—completed its fourth summer on the road. Bus members have talked with hundreds of people about climate change and its relationship to energy issues, alternative energy sources, energy conservation, and other lifestyle choices that promote sustainability.



An article in this month’s *Dartmouth Alumni Magazine* notes that Disney’s “Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs” is required viewing for Women’s and Gender Studies 21. The course is entitled “Mirror, Mirror On the Wall”...I AM NOT KIDDING!!!!

Working together over the past several months, the combined leadership of the Association of Alumni and the Alumni Council has developed a proposed amendment to the constitution of the Association of Alumni. It is hoped that the amendment will both (1) simplify, clarify, and strengthen the trustee election process; and (2) help to advance continuing discussions between the Association and the Board of Trustees about the prospect of increasing the number of alumni-nominated trustees.

The amendment calls for the Alumni Council to first nominate either one or two candidates for each vacancy. Assuming, based on consistent recent history, that at least one petition candidate will thereafter also be nominated, it is expected that this procedure will promote head to head elections. Alumni will cast only one vote for each vacancy according to the one person/one vote procedure. If there are three or more candidates for any one vacancy and no one receives an absolute majority of the votes cast, there will be a runoff election between the top two vote getters, thereby assuring that the winner will receive a majority of the votes cast.
