



Pietie and **Dick Birnie** were the cover subjects of the Dartmouth-Mary Hitchcock Norris Cotton Cancer Center's magazine *Focus*. The article, in the Spring 2010 issue, documented Dick's bout with prostate cancer and the support systems available to the Birnies. After Dick was diagnosed in 2002, Pietie "discovered that spouses were welcome in the monthly Man-to-Man prostate cancer support group offered at Norris Cotton...She decided to go---without Dick. 'He wasn't in the right frame of mind to go at the time,' she says. 'I found the group very helpful. It's really good to be able to talk to other spouses of cancer patients and survivors.'" Dick ultimately changed his mind about participating. "For me the most important thing is the terrific information, both from the presentations that offer high quality professional information about the disease, and from the information shared by other survivors in terms of the way they cope. There are also friendships and personal associations that develop" The article notes that support services are an integral part of the care provided at Norris Cotton.



The May/June *Dartmouth Alumni Magazine* featured an article by architecture critic **Will Morgan** and a piece on famous Dartmouth architects, including **Roc Caivano**. Will was asked to critique some of the newer buildings on campus; he is not impressed: “Dartmouth is behind its competitors in the game of commissioning outstanding new buildings...Much of the new Dartmouth comes across as a kind of outlet mall patiche of some mythical early American past.” He is, however, favorably impressed with, among other buildings, the East Wheelock Cluster, the Rockefeller Center, and Blunt Alumni Center.



The article on Dartmouth’s architects notes that “Caivano’s designs were more cutting-edge in the early 1970s, when, after Yale, he camped out of his car in Steamboat Springs, Colorado, unsure of what his future would be. Later he built a solar home in upstate New York with the capacity to burn junk mail as a backup heat source. Roc currently plays gate-keeper of Maine’s Mount Desert Island, where his four-employee practice has renovated shingle-sided summer mansions from the early 1900s with a deliberately light touch, in a style similar to his frequent contributions to Acadia National Park. Currently he’s turning a former naval base there into an educational complex.”



## Dartmouth College Fund

With a goal of \$225K, the class has now raised \$140K, or 62% of our goal. Participation (41%) is still lagging the 60% goal, so Head Agent **Bob Spence** has developed a matching gift plan, with the help of several classmates. Bob's letter explains the details:

Dear Classmate,

Our 45th reunion is approaching. We want to be the biggest, strongest collection of Dartmoose-mates (we're unique, after all) Dartmouth has ever produced. Two methods used to measure class strength are participation at reunions and participation in the DCF. The former is a gift to us; the latter is a gift to our legacies, the students.

So here's the deal: this year a small number of classmates have offered to give gifts over and above what they usually give to the DCF IF we can entice 60% of classmates to give to the Campaign this year, ending June 30. (Our usual rate is about 50%.) They have agreed to match each gift from a "lapsed donor" (a classmate who did not contribute to the Campaign last year and has not contributed to the Campaign as of the date of this letter) up to \$100 each with an aggregate total of \$3,000 if we can secure contributions from 60% or more of Classmates by June 30, 2010. If participation is less than 60%, the match will proportionally be reduced. The FIRST 20 re-activated donors will receive a "Dartmouth College" cap regardless of the final DCF participation rate.

I have no idea what that rate will be, we'll just call it a "mystery pot", like those used to cook mystery meat in Thayer Hall. AS A PARTICIPANT, WHETHER YOU'VE DONATED ALREADY OR ARE A NEW DONOR DONATING ANY AMOUNT WHATSOEVER, AND YOU ARE THE FIRST TO GUESS THE ACHIEVED PERCENTAGE OF CLASS PARTICIPATION (AS OF JUNE 30, 2010), YOU WILL WIN A \$25 STARBUCKS GIFT CERTIFICATE. (Lets face it; if I were really creative I'd have completed engineering!)

To reiterate, 60% of our entire Class has to participate by June 30 to complete the match. You make the first correct guess as to the achieved participation number your caffeine intake will exceed recommend levels.

Results will be published in the newsletter. Our Class, College and alums-to-be are counting on you.

### Mystery Patch



## In Memoria

**Peter Thomas Dole**, of Paris, IL, passed away on Monday, March 15, in Terre Haute, IN. He was the owner of Dole Law Offices in Paris. Born in Buffalo, N.Y., Pete entered Dartmouth from Lake Forest Academy, where he was a National Merit Scholar, swam, and played football. At the College he majored in history and was active in a number of activities: Zeta Psi Fraternity, the Interdormitory Council, the DOC (President of Bait and Bullet and Director of Freshman Trips), and Captain of the Rifle Team.

Pete enlisted in the U.S. Army, serving in Vietnam as a radio operator and paratrooper with the 101st Airborne Division "Screaming Eagles," earning two Bronze Stars for his later service in the Green Berets. At the completion of his military service he earned his juris doctorate from Vanderbilt University. After working two years for the Securities and Exchange Commission, he returned to his hometown of Paris in 1975, and was elected to a term as Edgar County State's Attorney. In 1980, he entered into partnership with his late father in Dole & Dole Attorneys at Law.



Pete was a member of the Presbyterian Church in Paris, where he served on the church board and as a deacon. He was the current City of Chrisman, IL attorney and a longtime member, board member, past president, and devoted supporter of the Paris YMCA. He also was an Eagle Scout and remained active in scouting throughout his life. Pete will be remembered as an avid outdoorsman who lived to hunt. Locally nicknamed "Deadeye Dole", he was a loyal supporter of Edgar County Pheasants Forever, serving as treasurer for several years, and was active in organizing and hosting the annual Sponsor Shoot and Youth Hunt. His dedication to upland fowl habitat creation earned national recognition. He also was a Life Sponsor of Ducks Unlimited, and was an accomplished racquetball player, back country skier, and cyclist. He especially loved his family, his friends and his dogs. Pete is survived by wife Becky and three daughters, Dr. Polly (Richard Bailey) Dole of Palmdale, Calif., Anna Dole of Chrisman, IL, and Ashley (Cliff) Hudson of Little Rock and three grandchildren, Emma Bailey, Lucy Hudson and Julia Bailey. For those who wish, the family suggests that memorials be made to the Paris, IL YMCA.



**Douglas S. Scarff**, of Shrewsbury, MA died on May 7 after a short battle with cancer. Matriculating at Dartmouth from Shaker Heights, OH, Doug was a graduate of the University School where he played basketball, football, and track, debated, and worked on the school newspaper. A government major at the College, Doug played freshman basketball and served on the IDC from Lord Hall. Competitive in all intramural athletics, he led Bones Gate to the Fraternity basketball title, with the help of **John Barbieri** and Bill Reilly '67.

Doug was a close personal friend, a brother of Bones Gate, which he served as Rush Chairman. After graduation, he entered Michigan Law (graduating in 1969) and we roomed together in New York City the summer of 1967, where I "interned" at Colgate-Palmolive and he at Shearman and Sterling. Later that year he served as an usher at Karen's and my wedding.

Starting off his law career at Shearman and Sterling, he then transferred to the United States Securities and Exchange Commission in Washington, D.C. At the SEC, he assumed increasingly advanced positions, including Director of the Division of Market Regulation. After a brief stint at a private law firm in DC, he returned to the SEC as Regional Administrator for the Boston Regional Office and then

Associate Regional Director of the Northeast Region out of New York City. At the time, the SEC was located in the World Trade Center and Doug was responsible for ensuring that all SEC employees had evacuated the building after the September 11, 2001 attack. He retired in 2006 and moved to Shrewsbury, MA, joining his partner of twenty-four years, Patricia Segerson.

Doug loved the outdoors and hiking, particularly the many walking trails of Martha's Vineyard. He frequently visited Subee and **Tim O'Keeffe** on Cape Cod and became close to their daughter Claire '07, attending her Dartmouth graduation. While in New York, Doug regularly "did lunch" with **Gerry Paul**, his Lord Hall roommate.

A memorial service will be scheduled at a later date. Donations can be made in Doug's memory to the Felix Neck Wildlife Sanctuary in Edgartown, MA or the Boston Athenaeum.
