Just a few days after my last Newsletter, President Dickey announced the name of Dartmouth's new dean, Carroll W. Brewster, a Yale graduate and a product of Yale Law School. Brewster, 32 years old and presently U.S. Commissioner in New Haven (and no relation to Yale's president), will replace the colorful Dean Thad beginning in June. Brewster has studied at Cambridge University and as an M.I.T. Fellow in the Sudan, where he was legal assistant to the Chief Justice of Sudan. At his first Big Green press conference, Brewster parried questions with the adroitness of a veteran Parkhurst administrator and avoided taking a definite stand on such crucial questions as the student's role in academic and social decision-making at the College, co-education, or the role of the College in the War; but, for what it's worth, the editors of The Dartmouth were impressed with his performance.

In other news from the Hanover Plain, social regulations continue to make headlines as the CCSC (the current student-faculty successor to the Committee on Ad and UGC-JC) battled with the Faculty Exec. Committee over who could do what with parietals violators. The CCSC had announced it would not prosecute parietals offenders unless the vilations were flagrant; the Exec. Committee insisted that the CCSC nail everybody caught with a girl after the 'witching hour;' at last report they were still arguing, forming study committees, and the like; meanwhile back in the dorms, well.... Also, the College faculty voted to lower the number of course credits for R.O.T.C. now and perhaps eliminate it altogether by 1972 pending negotiations with the Department of Defense. As R.O.T.C. is phased out, the girls are being phased in. The first major crack in the all-male Big Green facade was opened a month ago with the announcement that the College was accepting 70 women for the 1969-70 academic year -- on a non-degree basis. Co-education, once the most heated of issues (our Class is about the last to put up substantial opposition), is probably inevitable ... fortunately.

In Big Green winter sports, the B-Ball team finished strong with three wins and a 10-15 record, the best in almost a decade; Coach Ab Oakes' hockey squad wound up 7-14-2 overall and fourth in the Ivies (5-7); the swimmers continued 10-2 and tied with Princeton for second in the East behind Yale; and even the track and squash teams had winning records. The ski squad was invincible in the East and was second only to Denver (winner of Winter Carnival) in the N.C.A.A.'s. All in all, a tremendous season for Indian fans. Finally, Thayer Dean Myron Tribus, mentioned by quite a few of you as a good replacement for John Sloan, was named Assistant Secretary of Commerce in President Tricky Dick's administration.

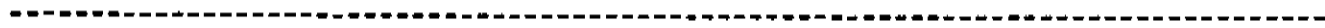
